# what's new

## **Expanding Access & Removing Barriers**

A foundational goal at CAMP is to make veterinary care affordable and accessible to all Angelenos. One way to achieve this is by expanding our service offerings and footprint. In 2023 CAMP celebrated two big expansion efforts that help bring more veterinary care to the community. In April, we were thrilled to open the doors to a new community medicine clinic in San Pedro, and in November we started hitting the streets with our new state-of-the-art veterinary clinic on wheels, the *Wellness Waggin'*.

Along with removing barriers for clients, CAMP also strives to remove barriers for veterinarians seeking to expand their knowledge of high-quality, high-volume spay/neuter and community medicine. In 2023 CAMP's Veterinary Training Project was honored to receive a generous grant to support these barrier breaking efforts.

# 2023

By providing high-volume veterinary clinics in targeted, historically excluded communities, staffed by veterinary professionals with expertise and sensitivity, we can reach the goal of reducing shelter intake and eliminating the euthanasia of adoptable animals. CAMP's comprehensive approach to animal welfare consists of five key program areas.

## 01 — HIGH VOLUME SPAY & NEUTER

When CAMP was founded in 2007, over 15,000 cats and dogs were euthanized in LA City shelters each year. Thanks to efforts from CAMP and other like-minded organizations, the LA Animal Services save rate increased from 57.7% in 2011 to 89.2% in 2021.

CAMP continues to contribute to this impressive trajectory by offering affordable spay and neuter in Los Angeles. In 2023 alone, CAMP veterinarians performed 23,108 spay/neuter surgeries. Since we opened our doors sixteen years ago, we are excited to report that we have fixed nearly 300,000 dogs and cats, helping to prevent the needless euthanasia of millions of cats and dogs in our community.

## 02 — COMMUNITY MEDICINE & ACCESS TO CARE

Nearly 50% of pets in the U.S. do not receive adequate veterinary care. Of those families that report challenges accessing care, approximately 70% say it is due to financial constraints. Without access to affordable veterinary care, it's possible that hundreds of local families would be forced to relinquish their pets to shelters in desperation. CAMP charges approximately 80% less than the fees a private veterinarian would charge, opening doors for so many.

CAMP's community animal medicine clinics performed thousands of quality of life services and lifesaving medical surgeries in 2023. Our veterinarians treat a wide range of health problems, such as infections, allergies, wound care, mass removals as well as dental services and surgical procedures, all at highly reduced rates.

In April 2023 we proudly opened the doors to our new San Pedro community medicine clinic. By December, we had already helped 2172 cats and dogs receive the medical care they needed and may not have otherwise been able to access and afford. Thanks to CAMP, now even more Los Angeles families have a safety net for their furry family members in times of need.

#### 03 — LOW COST VACCINE CLINICS

Vaccinating dogs and cats against infectious and life-threatening diseases is one of the most effective ways to help them live long, healthy lives. CAMP provides free and low-cost vaccinations at our four stationary clinic locations and by bringing these essential services directly to people who need it most via our CAMP mobile vaccine clinics. In 2023 we administered 93,820 life-saving vaccines to dogs and cats in our community. In addition to vaccines, CAMP mobile clinics also provide other basic wellness services such as microchipping, deworming and flea/tick treatment.

## 04 — ANIMAL WELFARE ADVOCACY

8,093 pets microchipped Transportation is a barrier for many of the families we serve. CAMP's low cost mobile vaccine clinics bring preventative medicine and advocacy directly into historically excluded communities, helping the people and pets who need it most. CAMP's bilingual staff members help to facilitate follow-up appointments at our stationary clinics and provide information on financial aid. They also educate families on the importance of spay/neuter and providing continued health and preventive care for the lifetime of their pet.

At all CAMP locations, our highly trained staff provides outreach and educates families about the benefits of preventative health care, including the value of microchipping your pets. In 2023 alone, 8,093 pets were microchipped across our stationary and mobile clinics. Microchips help families find lost pets and also help animal shelters return pets to their rightful owners efficiently and quickly, reducing shelter overcrowding and stress levels for all animals in the shelter.

# ON A ROLL! clinics

For many LA pets, a visit to a CAMP mobile clinic is often the very first time they will receive medical care, and in 2023 we made great strides to expand the breadth and reach of what is offered.

CAMP's Wellness Waggin', a state-of-the-art veterinary clinic on wheels, hit the streets in November, bringing expanded services directly to the community! The hard working CAMP mobile team accelerated planned offerings in order to meet an urgent need from Long Beach Animal Care Services by providing regular spay/neuter support. The team is also increasing spay/neuter services to support LA City shelters and offering regular public community medicine days.

#### 05 —VETERINARY TRAINING PROJECT

The Veterinary Training Project (VTP) provides veterinary professionals the opportunity to train in high-quality, high-volume spay/neuter (HQHVSN) surgical and clinical techniques. Accredited by the California Veterinary Medical Board, veterinarians also receive CE (Continuing Education) credit required annually in order to maintain their veterinary license. The skill set of HQHVSN is underrepresented in both the private and nonprofit veterinary communities and is essential in the quest to help curb the overpopulation of cats and dogs in shelters and to help prevent the unnecessary euthanasia of healthy animals.

34 vets trained

Since we piloted the program in late 2022, many VTP graduates have gone on to serve as relief vets at CAMP or work at other nonprofits and shelters. In 2023 we trained 34 veterinarians and spayed/neutered 2141 dogs and cats during the training sessions.

Thanks to generous funding from California for All Animals we were able to start offering valuable scholarships to qualified veterinary professionals in 2023. We look forward to removing more barriers and furthering expansion and access to the VTP into 2024 and beyond.

#### **KEEPING FAMILIES TOGETHER**

Every day in our clinics we meet families in need of urgent veterinary care for their beloved pets. In 2023 we met Baby, a very special dog...



Baby is a sweet tempered eight year old pit bull who came to CAMP in dire shape with a life-threatening bacterial infection of the uterus called pyometra. Baby's human dad was unhoused and not in a position to cover the costs, so CAMP stepped up and covered all the expenses for her emergency life saving surgery. After ensuring a safe recovery, Baby was reunited with her best friend and provided medication, food and bedding at no charge. Once healed, Baby returned to CAMP for her vaccines and we are happy to report she is thriving...For people facing housing or food insecurity, their pet may be one of their only sources of joy and stability. CAMP helps make a difference in people's lives.
